GRAMMAR: Narrative tenses

We use the <u>past simple</u> to talk about finished actions and situations in the past.

In the 1870s, they **bought** a 160-acre plot of land in the area.

We use the past continuous to talk about activities in progress in the past.

By 1900, the number of residents in Hollywood **was increasing** significantly.

We use the <u>past perfect simple</u> when we talk about two things that happened at different times in the past.

Before they started to move to Hollywood, filmmakers **had been based** on the coast of the United States.

We use the <u>past perfect continuous</u> to talk about actions or situations that were in progress before another action or situation. We also use it to talk about the duration of a past action up to a certain point in the past.

Daeida **had been travelling** home by train one day when she came across a woman from Ohio who told her that her house was called Hollywood.

I'd been watching the programme every week, but I missed the last episode.
