Magical /mysteries

Harry Houdini, a name synonymous with death-defying feats of escapism, still makes people wonder today how he did it. But who was the man behind the name?

Born Erich Weiss in Hungary in 1874, he first took an interest in magic at a young age when he went to see a travelling magician called Dr. Lynn. The young Weiss was amazed at the skill and sleight of hand that Dr. Lynn used to perform the 'linking rings' trick. However, it wasn't until he reached the age of 17 that he chose magic over factory work with a factory workmate, Jack Hayman. They formed a duo called the Houdini Brothers, naming themselves after Weiss's idol at that time, Jean Eugene Robert-Houdin, a famous French magician. The duo created their own trademark act called 'The Crate Escape': one of them was locked inside a sealed crate and had to escape.



Houdini went on to work without Hayman, but success did not come quickly. It took him five years and a lot of hard work to become established in the world of magic, and it wasn't until 1898 that he became the legend he still is today. He made his name with his 'Challenge Act'. It was based on the simple principle of generating as much publicity for himself as he could. He would arrive in a town, book a theatre and declare that he could escape from anything, but more often than not it involved lots of pairs of handcuffs. It seemed unbelievable that he could have unlocked so many pairs of handcuffs and free himself without anyone noticing anything, and yet he did it time after time. No one could work out his secret. It was rumoured that he might have hidden different sets of keys inside a belt, which enabled him to unlock the handcuffs. However he did it, the public soon tired of this illusion and his popularity began to dwindle. The public needed something new and even more daring.

In 1896, Houdini added a new dimension to his act. He had himself fastened inside a straitjacket and suspended high above the ground. Within minutes he had freed himself from the jacket and was back down on the ground. The act was a huge success, but Houdini then wanted something even more daring. He had himself thrown into the Hudson River in New York in a sealed milk can, which he escaped from within minutes. His most sensational trick was the 'Water Torture Cell', in which he was immersed head first in a glass tank full of water with his feet padlocked and emerged a few minutes later smilling, if a little wet.

We may never know the real secret behind his great escapes, but what we do know is that even today escapologists and performers like David Blaine still try and emulate the feats of the great Houdini. His reputation as the world's greatest escape artist remains.
